

1.0 INTRODUCTION

1.1 The Kids school project

The Kid's school project with a bursary program approach was developed to assist vulnerable students with basic assistance in form of school fees and school items. The program was first introduced in 2021 with 14 students from primary, secondary school education level with 1 at university level who finished her studies in 2022. In the school year 2022-2023 for which this report is about, the project supported 15 learners in various class levels of the already registered from the 2021-2022 school year in the mentioned school levels and for the Early Childhood Education (ECD), the foundation supports children from ECDs such as; Chitowa, Chilipa and Bridging.

1.2 Background of Window of Hope Foundation

Window of Hope Foundation (WoHF) is a locally founded organization. It serves vulnerable populations by providing applicable support through innovative and evidence based approaches within the concept of community empowerment. It focuses on health, education and community development. It was initiated in 2011, its goal is to reach the vulnerable populations including those in hard to reach areas with basic support to enable them access services of health and education in order to promote rural development and contribute to achievement of Sustainable Development Goals 4,3,2,1 and 6.

1.3 Project scope

Window of Hope foundation planned to be addressing five issues:

- 1. Social-economic empowerment
- 2. Low access to education & high illiteracy rate
- 3. Supporting maternal death orphans
- 4. Community empowerment
- 5. Infrastructure development

The foundation therefore has four thematic areas; these include:

- Community empowerment for ownership and increased uptake of basic services of health, education and development
- Implementing and modelling applicable innovative initiatives to break the cycle of poverty, ill health and illiteracy on grounds of equity, capacity building to reach out to vulnerable populations and contribute to development
- Sustainable development of rural areas through social investing and-economic empowerment activities and entrepreneurship.
- Access to education including early childhood development (by ECD), preschool, adult literacy and basic education for marginalized and vulnerable people.

1.4 Vision and Mission

1.4.1 Vision:

Improved lives of the vulnerable populations, realized socio-economic development and developing rural communities.

1.4.2 Mission statement:

WoHF is a charitable organization in the development of vulnerable populations in poor resourced countries like Malawi.

It exists to be a leading organization in providing applicable support to maternal death orphans in the district and wide. Motivating parents and children to invest in education from a tender age (ECD), promoting social-economic and community empowerment. Being a male child in a child headed family (headed by his sister Patricia Luka), he felt going to school was a wasted time as he would rather seek piece works to assist his family. Thanks to the program Daniel Luka was encouraged to continue with his education following the famous Chichewa proverb "Chobwela mawa sichidziwika, chakudza sichiimba ng'oma", which means no one knows what comes tomorrow, Daniel accepted to further his education and now he is in standard 5. In his appreciation speech Daniel said "Ndimapita kukasaka ma ganyu

olima mminda ya anthu kuti tipeze chakudya kotelo kumakhala kovuta kuti ndipeze ndalama zogulira zofunikila ku school, ndikubwera kwa upangili wa bungweli ndi makhwanitsa kupeza zofunikila pa school yanga kotelo ndili oyamika pa thandizo mumandipatsa",

The bursary program has helped me to find needed learning materials to help me succeed in class. Previously it was difficult I could go for peace work to find my basic need. I am thankful to the foundationd's support.

Like Daniel Luka, William Eliasi was a school dropout due to lack of learning materials. A brilliant student William did not hide his excitement towards the program as he aspires to be a teacher to educate his community in the near future. "Ndi thandizo limene ndimalandila la sukulu; ndimafuna nditakhala mphunzitsi kuti ndizakwanitse kuphunzitsa anthu akwathu" (With the support I am receiving I want to be educated and become a teacher one day in my community to provide education services to my community)- said William as he was smiling expressing his gratitude.

Samiyatu Gavanala is a hard worker and a dedicated student per the school's evaluation. She comes from a poor background and with the help of the program, she has managed to go back to school and now she is in standard 5. "Azanga ena anapita kuma banja kamba kakusowa zochita ndili oyamika kwambiri chifukwa cha thandizoli limene likundipangitsa kukhala olimbikila ku sukulu mmalo mokwatila" (My friends got married because the lacked such support, I am fortunate I was considered for the support. With this support I work hard in school and forget about marriage, I am young).

It is believed that educating a girl child equals to educating the whole community and Agness would like to live up to the phrase by uplifting her matrilineal community.




Figure 11. Gerald Pearson, Kapire community day secondary school.



Achievements of the program

Since the program started, it has managed to make strides in improving education to the needy children. The greatest achievement of the program has been the success story of Bright Kapito who was assisted from primary school education through to tertiary education. Bright is now a graduate with a bachelor's degree in education from the University of Malawi formally called Chancellor College the for-university education Quality centre found him a sponsor.

For the Kid's School project, at University level - the project assisted Linda Pasowathu who graduated from Livingstonia University in 2022 with a bachelor's degree in journalism.

The program has also improved the education of many including primary school learners and secondary school learners from different schools and areas within Mangochi and other districts.

Despite the good achievements the program has also recorded some poor performance from students mainly attributed to the effects of Covid pandemic and cyclone Freddy and food insecurity among others. These affected school programs as most of the schools in Mangochi and others districts and had resulted in poor performance by some hard learners' families. However their learners and guardians motivation momentum has kept increasing, that we are no being reached for support by learners and guardians from different districts.

CONCLUSION

The program has helped a lot of underprivileged children who were being robbed of their right to education. Malawi as a third world country, accessing education is always a challenge but the program has provided the helping hand, this is a direct correspondence to global goal 4 which states "Achieving inclusive and quality education for all reaffirms the belief that education is one of the most powerful and proven vehicles for sustainable development. This goal ensures that all girls and boys complete free primary and secondary schooling by 2030". As a partner Window of Hope Foundation would like to see the continuity of the program as it provides to needed assistance to many underprivileged children to attain their education.
